JIM LEMON'S HISTORY CLASS QUILTS

These photos are from Jim Lemon's history students during the early nineties. He had taken a quilting class from Faye West and thought it would be good to add quilting to the curriculum when studying the Reformation Period after the Civil War. Each child made a square and put their name in it. Then the ladies of the Parent Teacher School Organization (PTSO) sewed the squares together. The quilt was then raffled off for money for the school. Later, the students made landscape quilts that were designed by the students. This helped with math skills as well as history.





RECYCLING THE PAST — Members of the 8th grade orange team in Jim Lemmon's North Carolina history class at Northwest Cabarrus Middle School were each required to sew and quilt a square, with 60 of the best squares being sewn into a quilt by the school's PTSO. The project was designed to teach students about the lives of the state's first settlers. The crazy quilt pattern was us ed because any material could be used, even recycled scraps. The quilt will be given away Thursday during the PTSO meeting.

LAST MEETING MINUTES

Under design is balance, proportion, rhythm, dominance and unity. A quilt must be balanced in design and, everything must fit together for proportion, there are three types of

and rhythm, regular, flowing progressive. Dominance is what your eye goes to first and for unity all parts work together. A quilt must look heavier on the bottom. Under execution whether it be hand applique, machine applique, hand embroidery, or machine embroidery the stitches must be consistent and secure. Embellishments must be secure and add to the quilt. Borders have to long line and straight. Bottom line is a judge is human. We need to take the critique as a learning tool. Remember you are making your quilt for you not the judge and maintain your joy.

Connie Richardson contacted CVAN and they are pleased with what we are donating, and we are hitting the mark on what they need. Victory Junction uses two quilts for auction and are very happy with the quilts and teddy bears.

The activity for October will be in the September newsletter. Stephanie Mayes thanked everyone who has helped out so far. She said the church has been very cooperative with the guild. Remember to drop off your quilts for judging on Tuesday starting at 8:30am at 601 Cabarrus Ave. the judging will be on Wednesday and the set up will start on Thursday at 9:00am at the church.

OCTOBER WORKSHOP SUPPLY LIST

In the Paper Piecing Workshop, you will be learning the BASIC ELEMENTS of HOW to Paper Piece. The Workshop will show you how to use the Add-A-Quarter ruler and getting use to the idea of doing things BACKWARDS to achieve wonderful Flying Geese points, Mariner's Compasses, New York Beauties, etc. But to achieve those beautiful blocks, there is fabric waste.

Therefore, for workshop purposes, bring fabric that you don't care about cutting up, UGLY fabric, or the "wonder what was I thinking when I bought this" fabric. Whatever fabric you bring, keep in mind it is for class experimentation, there will be waste, and sometimes "hacked up."

How much fabric to bring? Some fat quarters or 10 inch squares, or jelly roll, or 1/4 yard cuts, or bring a gallon size zip lock bag of assorted fabrics or a small shoe box size scrap bin.

We will make SMALL blocks, like Log Cabin, Courthouse Steps, Crazy Patch, (choice of simple) Flower blocks, etc. For those feeling adventurous, there will be a SIMPLE New York Beauty block with Flying Geese arc(s). I will supply the patterns. So. . . here's the supply list:

1. Sewing Machine & general sewing supplies and notions for any class

2. Rotary cutter

3. Rotary mat - medium size cutting board; no smaller than 10" X 12", 12" X 18" or the like. Doesn't have to be huge. More like personal use.

4. A ruler measuring about 3 1/2" X 12" - basically, a ruler you are comfortable using to squaring up blocks.

5. Flower pins. This is a long pin with a FLAT flower glued to the end of each pin. The flower is flat so the paper can easily be folded back over the pin and still lay flat. Flat Flower pins are also good to use while rotary cutting. This will make sense when seen in the workshop.

6. Add-A-Quarter ruler - either 6", 12", or 18" - your preference

7. Elmer's glue stick or your choice of fabric glue stick/pen

8. SEAM RIPPER (!!!!)

9. Quarter inch foot OR able to move needle to sew a quarter inch seam allowance.

10. Scotch tape - NOT CELLOPHANE

TAPE. Cellophane tape with WREAK HAVOC on your machine.

11. Stiletto or Purple Thang

12. High quality sewing thread - 50 wt.

13. Open toe/Applique foot or a presser foot to see

the "sewing line" on the pattern.

14. Portable ironing surface (optional)

15. Microtex Sharps needles (optional). Since this

is a workshop, bring what you have. NO

BALLPOINTS

16. Extra bobbins - optional.

QUILTING SUPERSTITIONS

It is October, and while celebrating Halloween, it is fun to look at quilting superstitions throughout history. Be warned, it seems there was a lot of quilt shaking happening back in the day. They were either shaking quilts at people or throwing cats around in quilts to see where they would run out... Well, they did not have the internet back then and I'm guessing they needed to be entertained somehow!

Quilting Superstitions

- Never make a quilt with 13 blocks.
- If you sew on a Sunday, you will have to pull out all of those stitches with your nose when you get to heaven.
- If you begin a quilt on Friday, you will never live to finish it.
- You are supposed to sleep under your quilt when it is finished, even if it is going to be a gift.

- If a thread breaks, it will bring misfortune.
- Stitch a spider web design into a quilt to bring good luck.
- It's bad luck to give away your first quilt.
- When a person is ill, it is said if they sleep with a quilt, all the love from the quilt will heal them.
- Never make human figures on a quilt. It is believed the figures will walk and visit you at night.
- If you start a quilt in the form of a star, someone in the family will die before it is finished.
- If you dream while sleeping under a quilt for the first time, the dream will come true. Marriage quilts should be laid out fresh so that dreams on the first night will come true.

On Love & Marriage

- Back in the day of making quilts for your hope chest, young ladies made a charm quilt made of 999 squares of fabric. The 1000th piece was supposed to come from the sleeve of the fella they were going to marry.
- Bridal quilt should be quilted with continuous borders of vines or ribbon-like patterns. A broken border is said to foretell a broken marriage.
- A girl who begins piecing a quilt will not marry until it is finished. If an unmarried girl puts the last stitch in the quilt, she will become an old maid. (Thus the practice of filling a hope chest with quilt tops, not finished quilts)
- If a young lady shakes a new quilt out the door, the first man who comes through the door will be her future husband. If two people shake a cat in the quilt, the one near where the cat runs out will marry first.
- When a quilt is first taken off the frame, wrap it around an unmarried woman to give her luck in finding a mate. Throw it at the first single man she sees to charm him into a relationship.
- If someone wraps you in a new quilt, you will get married within a year.
- If you break a needle, the next baby will be yours.
