



Sew Get To Know Someone This Month!

Growing up on a farm in Northwestern, Ohio, I started sewing when I was 7 or 8, with feed sack fabric (of which I still have some) on an old sewing machine. Because my mother didn't sew at all, I taught myself to sew my clothes getting ideas and patterns from the newspaper. It was then that I discovered 5" penny squares at the Five and Dime store, which I sewed together, making my first quilt. By the time I was in high school, I was making most of my clothes. I did odd jobs and used my allowance money to buy fabric whenever I could--an obsession began.

I went to college/nursing school and didn't sew or make any more quilts until 1978, when I got married. My husband Michael, bought me my very own sewing machine and has been supportive of my hobbies and interests ever since. In the 80's I took Eleanor Burns Log Cabin in Day, and made my second quilt. I sewed for my kids in between moving nine times and doing home décor. I watched quilting shows and became inspired. When I became an empty-nester about seven years ago I started quilt number three.

What I like to do most is to learn new quilting techniques, therefore I have many UFOs. Besides quilting, I enjoy knitting, crocheting, weaving..... I am currently teaching three of my grandchildren how to sew. My daughter Laura surprised me by making a quilt and entering it in this year's Cabarrus quilt show as her five young children "helped" her.

We've lived in Charlotte for 20 years. I have two girls, Julie and Laura, and a boy, Alan, who has two children and lives in Cary, NC. Julie and her husband and their six children, live with my husband and myself, in our semi-divided home. Grandma has her space so she can makes quilts for her thirteen grandchildren.

SEWING TIPS AND TRICKS

With the holiday season just around the corner you'll have to be even more efficient with your quilting time to accomplish your "to do's" without creating more "UFOs." Use these tips to whip out your quilts in no time flat!

1. Duct tape to the rescue

If you are cutting pieces of fabric that are longer than your cutting mat, borrow a mat from a friend and tape it to yours. Lay both mats face down and slide the edges together until they meet evenly. Join them together with a strip of duct tape and then turn the mats over and cut the long strips without having to shift your fabric.

2. Tape your rulers

Even if the measurement you need for your cutting strips is on your ruler, it can be helpful to place a piece of masking tape on the underside of the ruler at whichever line you are using. The edge becomes an important visual guide that keeps you on target and speeds up your cutting.

3. Stagger your strips

After cutting strips to the correct width, you can make additional sub-cuts bystaggering each strip across your cutting mat withone long edge aligned with the long marks onyour mat.Place the next strip next to the next longmark, overlapping your first strip. Keep the long fabric edges even with the mat markings. Place your ruler acrossall the strips, and then make your sub-cuts all at once.

4. Spin your mat

Limited studio space leaves little room for cutting. If you have lots of cutting to do, move to your kitchen or dining room table. When you have to sub-cut your fabric, position it on the mat and make your first cut. But instead of shifting the fabric and risking misaligning its edges, spin your cutting mat to make the sub-cuts easier to do.

5. Let your tool do the work

Many quilters mistakenly keep theirblade guard nut so tight that the cutter "slices" the fabriclike a knife. However, the rotary cutting blade should actually ROTATE like a pizza cutting wheel. Loosen the nutholding your blade in place so thatthebladespins as you slide it along the ruler.

6. Give your cutter a tune-up

It doesn't take much lintbuild-up between your cutting blade and the guard to impact your cutter's performance. Carefully remove the cutting blade and wipe it clean. Put a single drop of clear sewing machine oil on the blade guard, then reinsert the blade. Wipe up excess.

7. Sharpen your scissors

Blades that chew up your fabric or don't cut near the tip arefrustrating. Invest in a quality pair of scissors and make sure you only use it for fabric, not for paper or other materials.

8. Mate fabrics for sewing

If you will be sewing two different fabrics together from the same cut unit, place the fabrics right sides together and press them together. Then cut your strips fromboth fabrics at the same time. They will already be in place for piecing.

9. Cut triangles from squares

Determine whether your squares will need one diagonal cut or two. For extra stability, use a cutting ruler that will completely cover the square's tip when you cut the diagonal. This helps to stop the cutting blade from pushing the fabric and stretching the bias.

10. Mark your mat

If you are using reference lines on your cutting mat, but you can't see the line markings or reference numbers along all four edges, place a length of masking tape along the unmarked edges, then add your reference numbers so that you can see what each line represents in inches without sliding your fabric or moving your ruler.

Sew What's for Dinner?



BEEF BARLEY VEGETABLE SOUP

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 (3 pound) beef chuck
- roast
- 1/2 cup barley
- 1 bay leaf
- 2 tablespoons oil 3 carrots, chopped
- 3 stalks celery, chopped
- 1 onion, chopped

1 (16 ounce) package

frozen mixed vegetables

4 cups water 4 cubes beef bouillon cube 1 tablespoon white sugar 1/4 tsp. black pepper 1 (28 ounce) can chopped stewed tomatoes salt and pepper to taste

DIRECTIONS:

 In a slow cooker, cook chuck roast until very tender (usually 4 to 5 hours on High, but can vary with different slow cookers). Add barley and bay leaf during the last hour of cooking. Remove meat, and chop into bite-size pieces. Discard bay leaf. Set beef, broth, and barley aside.

 Heat oil in a large stock pot over medium-high heat. Sauté carrots, celery, onion, and frozen mixed vegetables until tender. Add water, beef bouillon cubes, sugar, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, chopped stewed tomatoes, and beef/barley mixture. Bring to boil, reduce heat, and simmer 10 to 20 minutes. Season with additional salt and pepper to taste.


