#### From the President's Desk:

For the past few days I have been doing something I put off for a long time. From the time I started quilting I saved every quilting magazine I bought. After all, there were interesting articles and beautiful patterns in every book. I knew that one day I might want to go back to that book and make a quilt using that pattern. The fact that I would have to go through a mountain of books to find the vaguely remembered pattern didn't seem to matter. Besides, as the new books came in there were always new techniques and patterns to interest me. The pile of books mounted and I never seemed to go back through them when I was looking for a pattern. After all, there were new books and magazines to choose patterns from. One day I realized that the books were just taking precious space I could use for other quilting items. I bit the bullet and started going through the magazines one by one looking for patterns I wanted to tear out and keep and articles that gave me instructions that I might need. Many magazines went into a stack to be sent to the guilt show's White Elephant. Others were torn apart with me keeping parts of them and the remainder added to our recycle bin.

In all of this process I realized something. The fabrics and patterns that interested me as when I began quilting are not the ones I am interested in now. I know that fabric makers learned long ago to change their patterns and choices of color every year. After all, why would we buy new fabric if the pieces in our stash looked the same as the new ones? The first quilt I made was very traditional and was primarily brown. If you checked my stash now, you would find very little brown fabric. My quilts are more likely to be colorful art quilts than traditional ones although I

appreciate both styles. My taste has changed along with the fabric I collect.

What I realize is that just like many other aspects of life, quilting is a process. Where I started is not where I am now nor is it where I expect to be in the future. I can appreciate the quilts I was interested in making 10 years ago although they are not what I want to make now. The quilts I might choose to make would probably be different from those you would choose. We don't need our quilts to be the same. What I believe to be important is that we each are growing in our art.

#### June 2014 - Minutes

The meeting began at 6:45 p.m. The social period was open from 6:15 to 6:45 during which refreshments were served, visitors greeted, sign ups (workshops, greeters, refreshments) occurred and members paid dues. Refreshments were provided by: Jane Dempster, Cathy Hooper, and Dee Matney. Greeters were June Dale and Linda Brimanson.

President Carolyn Sweet opened the meeting by welcoming visitors and new members. She also thanked the guild for the lovely card and gift she received while recuperating from surgery Pat Arndt welcomed speaker Nancy G. Cook, who shared her nature-inspired quilts. Nancy discussed her stamping, inking, and quilting techniques and how she creates her designs and templates. Pat gave a brief run-down of July, August, and September's programs. July is Mickey Depre (rescheduled workshop) and August will be the picnic and guild challenge, September is a wonky log cabin. More sign-ups are needed for July and September. A reminder was given to pay for workshops by the meeting the month before the program. Seven members who participated in the Plain Jane workshop showed their projects.

Several quilts and projects were shown.

#### Sew Get To Know Someone This Month!

My sewing interest starts with my good friend, Kitsie. She encourage me to knit, learn to cross stitch and start sewing in my spare time with 4 children. I knitted a few sweaters for the boys, tried some cross stitch and bought my first sewing machine with green stamps. I moved from up-state

New York to Michigan and finally ended up in North Carolina in 1980 and received my BS in Education from East Carolina University in 1986. I continued to stayed in touch with my friend and she was now quilting and told me to buy this book called "Quilt in a Day" by Eleanor Burns. She continued me on the path to guilting and moved me beyond my comfort zone of blocks to a completed quilt. Peggy put the social and educational part back in my life and it didn't take long before I joined the Cabarrus Quilters Guild. Being part of a guild, taking classes, buying fabric, and attending shows is what makes life good.

My proudest moment was when one of my quilts was chosen Best of Show in the Cabarrus Quilt Show. I still love going to my studio to quilt, it is great therapy for me.

## Sew What's Cooking?



**Crabmeat Appetizers** 

1 lb. Back fin Crabmeat

1 Egg, beaten

1 cup Ritz Crackers, crushed

1 tsp. Yellow Mustard

2 tbsp. Fresh Lemon Juice

2 tbsp. Fresh Parsley, chopped

1 tsp. Old Bay Seasoning

1 tbsp. Worcestershire Sauce

Place crabmeat in a mixing bowl, picking any stray shell fragments out. Add crushed crackers, Old Bay Seasoning & parsley to the crab. In a separate bowl, combine egg, mustard, lemon juice and Worcestershire sauce. Whip with a whisk until smooth. Pour egg mixture over the crabmeat and crackers and gently mix careful not to break up large lumps of crabmeat. Mold into golfball sized balls and place on a cookie sheet. Bake @ 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Drizzle w/ melted butter and allow to cool.

## Sew Helpful Hints & Tricks

- 1. The next time you're giving a quilt as a gift, why add a quilt pouch to the back? When you give a quilt as a gift, make a small muslin envelope, 4 x 4 inches, and mark on the outside that it contains fabrics from the quilt for any needed repairs. Put 3 x 3 inch squares of all the fabrics inside and then stitch the envelope closed. Slipstitch it onto the quilt backing in the corner opposite the label. The envelope can easily be removed if desired, but encourage the recipient to keep it attached as the swatches will be laundered the same as the quilt, and will be a closer match (if they're needed) than if they were stored in a drawer."
- 2. Divided Needle Storage A small embroidery floss container is perfect for storing sewing machine needles. You can store a different size in each compartment so it's easy to find the one you need.
- 3. Gum containers with snap-shut lids make perfect dispensers for ribbon and trims. Roll up the ribbon, place it in the container, and thread the end through the opening. You can pull out only what you need and the rest stays neatly in the container.
- 4. Can't find the time to read and quilt? Listen to books on tape while you stitch.


