September 2014 - Minutes

Minutes were approved from the August meeting. Pat Arndt introduced the speaker Amy Winsor who provided a program showing her work with the theme "when you can't precision piece and hate math." There are several openings for the October workshop with Sharyn Cole. Her workshop will teach us how to appliqué the easy need-turn way using your sewing machine.

Candy McManaway gave an update on guild activities.

Quilt Show Chair Jo Anna Cupp spoke about the upcoming quilt show. We have more than enough quilts for the show. We currently have 25 vendors for the show in October. A discussion was held concerning the pros and cons of having a quilt show every year. It was felt that unless it is held every year, we could lose a following of quilters and vendors who plan to attend each year. It could also be a problem to rent the arena on the same

date if we did not hold the show yearly. Jo Anna agreed to act as chair again in 2015 but we will need a chairperson for the 2016 quilt show. We are also looking for committee chairs for show book, advertising and white elephant booth. The fee that is paid to the judges is not completely covered by the entry fees. We pay the judges their fee, mileage, hotel and food. Other costs include ribbons, cash prizes, programs, advertising and printing of the show book. A motion was made and seconded that we have the quilt show yearly. The motion was carried.

A ten minute break was taken. Members who had quilts to show were recognized. September birthdays were recognized with a fat quarter for each member present. A door prize was given. The meeting was then adjourned.



Sew Get To Know Someone This Month!



Rosita Blackwelder

My name is Rosita Blackwelder. I am married to Rick and have three children and seven grandchildren. I have lived in Mt. Pleasant for 10 years. I have been quilting for 35 years. I made my first quilt with one of our charter members, Faye West. She was a close friend of my husband's family when we married. My very first quilt was a sampler quilt in mauve and browns based on the techniques of Georgia Bonesteel. My 35 year old daughter has that quilt now and sleeps under it nightly. Needless to say my taste in fabric and quilting style have changed but my love for the art, quilts and fabric has only grown!!



Debbie Morse

I started sewing as a teen when I was unable to find clothes to fit off the store racks. I also made baby quilts for family, friends and co-workers. I had an aunt who took me to the Miami (FL) fashion district to buy fabric so I could make her and my mother suits for work, and of course enough to

make outfits for myself. One of my memories is making bathing suits to match every sportswear outfit I made.

My first full-size quilt was a tumbler pattern made in 1975 from fabrics used to make clothing for me and my family. I used a sheet for the backing and a blanket for batting and tied the guilt with yarn. I started more serious quilting in 2002 when my sister-in-law was a victim of domestic violence in Black Mountain. Her children gave me all her fabric and a few small UFO projects. I have made quilts to honor Meg for family & friends since and still have a large stash. I joined the Cabarrus Quilters Guild in February of 2004 and since then I have enjoyed taking classes and working on guild activities to learn more guilt techniques. I traveled by car throughout the southeast for work between 2003 and 2012. During this travel and our vacations, my husband and I stopped at many quilt shops, hobby shops (radio controlled race cars is Mike's hobby), and locations featured on the Diners, Drive-Inns and Dives TV show. My husband tells all that we have been to guilt shops from Key West to Alaska, and we have been to 106 DDD locations. He is an enabler, and often picked out fabrics for purchase, especially to make Stack N Whack quilts.

When I quit working full-time as a credit manager in December, 2012, my plan was to start working on my stash and the 35 kits I had accumulated. I am still working on this, and most of my quilts are donations as my family in Florida has told me they do not need any more quilts. I still work part time as a credit monitor for commercial credit meetings so I still enjoy traveling on day trips during two weeks of each month. I quilt, shop at quilt shops and attend quilt shows and shop hops during the rest of the month. Over the past 3 years, I have lost 60 pounds by changing diabetes medicines and taking water aerobics classes and working out at the Kannapolis Y, and I expect to start sewing

clothes again soon as adding elastic to the back of my pants is no longer working.

Mike & I have been married for 32 years, have a son living in Carbondale, IL and a 16 year old granddaughter, Cassidy, in Ferndale, CA. We moved to Kannapolis 24 years ago, joining many of our racing friends who had moved from South Florida to join NASCAR teams.

Sew Helpful Hints & Tricks

- 1. Pre-wind neutral bobbins. This is an especially helpful idea when attending a class or retreat. Store your collection of pre-wound bobbins in a bobbin case, and you're ready to sew for hours (or days)! Pre-wound bobbins can also be purchased from some thread manufacturers.
- 2. Cut strips from inexpensive vinyl/cling wrap and wrap it around a thread spool and bobbin to keep the thread from unraveling.
- 3. Use a pants hanger to hold your pattern book to keep it from getting lost under fabric. Hang the hanger on a bulletin board, a nail in the wall or a kitchen-cabinet knob.
- 4. Store sewing tools in a silverware basket from an old dishwasher, and hang it on a pegboard. A revolving pencil holder is also great for tool storage.
- 5. When you have those little thread bits from, say, a seam you just unsewed, a nylon-net dish scrubbie is a great (and cheap) tool for swiping them off your clothing. You can get craft netting at fabric and craft shops by the yard, to make your own for pennies on the dollar. Either gather strips, using your machine basting stitch, to make a sewn thread remover, or cut strips and crochet them.

Sew What's Cooking?



Ruth Chris' Sweet Potato Casserole

CRUST:

1 cup brown sugar1/3 cup flour1 cup chopped nuts (pecans preferred)1/4 cup butter (melted)

SWEET POTATO MIXTURE:

3 cups mashed sweet potatoes (can use canned to save time, just drain)

1 cup sugar

1/2 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon vanilla

2 eggs (well beaten)

1/2 cup butter, melted (1/2 cup)

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Combine brown sugar, flour, nuts and butter in mixing bowl. Set aside.
- Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- 3. Combine sweet potatoes, sugar, salt, vanilla, eggs and butter in a mixing bowl in the order listed. Mix thoroughly.
- 4. Pour mixture into buttered baking dish.
- 5. Sprinkle the surface of the sweet potato mixture evenly with the crust mixture.
- 6. Bake for 30 minutes. Allow to set at least 30 minutes before serving.
